Entrance antiphon

O sing a new song to the Lord, for he has worked wonders; in the sight of the nations, he has shown his deliverance, alleluia

He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

The priest briefly welcomes everyone to St Laurence's, and introduces the theme of the mass. We are then invited to call to mind whatever we have done wrong in the sight of God. The priest will sprinkle us with water from the font to remind us that it is through our baptism into Jesus's death and resurrection that our sins are forgiven.

As we are sprinkled, we sing:

I saw water flowing from the right side of the temple, alleluia! It brought God's life and his salvation. And the people sang in joyful praise: Alleluia, Alleluia! (Ezekiel 47:1)

Almighty God,

have mercy upon you, forgive you your sins and bring you to eternal life. Amen.

Our sins forgiven, we sing the song of the angels:

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The prayer of the day

Almighty ever-living God, constantly accomplish the Paschal Mystery within us, that those you were pleased to make new in Holy Baptism may, under your protective care, bear much fruit and come to the joys of life eternal Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.

Then everyone sits to listen to the Old Testament reading (the readings are printed out in the Centrefold of this booklet).

Afterwards, we all sing a psalm.

After the Gospel, please be seated for the sermon. During the sermon, your children are very welcome to go to the Lady Chapel with all the other young people, to do some singing.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God It is right to give thanks and praise.

Father, we give you thanks and praise through your beloved Son Jesus Christ, your living Word,

through whom you have created all things; who was sent by you in your great goodness to be our Saviour.

By the power of the Holy Spirit he took flesh; as your Son, born of the blessed Virgin, he lived on earth and went about among us; he opened wide his arms for us on the cross; he put an end to death by dying for us; and revealed the resurrection by rising to new life; so he fulfilled your will and won for you a holy people.

And now we give you thanks because in his victory over the grave a new age has dawned,

the long reign of sin is ended, a broken world is being renewed and humanity is once again made whole.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of power and might; heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world;

rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension,

and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise & thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Laurence and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever Amen.

Remaining standing, we sing together the Lord's prayer:

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation
but deliver us from evil.

Amen.

Please kneel.

While the bread is broken, the choir sing:

All who are prepared and are accustomed to receiving holy communion are invited to join with us this morning. Please follow the guidance of the churchwardens, who will invite you to the front of the church to receive if you wish. Please receive the host standing. Reception of the Chalice is optional. If you wish to receive the Blood of Christ, please drink directly from the Cup. If you choose not receive the chalice, please pause to acknowledge the Blood of Christ (e.g. by a slight bow).
